Accompanied by two guitars, double bass, and alternating saxophone, clarinet, and bass clarinet, the German-Israeli violinist **Max Eisinger** celebrates the cultural richness of the 20th century. This program is a tribute to the music that was nearly erased from German cultural life in its darkest times—honoring legends such as **Schnuckenack Reinhardt**, **Louis Armstrong**, **Fritz Kreisler**, **Giora Feidman**, **Irving Berlin**, **Astor Piazzolla**, and many more.

Max Eisinger - Violin

Born in 1993 in Munich, Max Eisinger began playing violin at age five. As part of a German-Israeli family, he discovered his love of improvisation through Klezmer, which eventually led him to jazz. At eleven, he debuted at the Munich Philharmonic Hall, followed by concert tours across Europe as a soloist, orchestral, and jazz musician.

Max studied classical violin, jazz, and composition in Nuremberg, Hanover, Warsaw, and Amsterdam. His compositions have been performed by the Dutch National Opera & Ballet, the Nuremberg Symphony Orchestra, and in numerous film and theatre productions. He teaches at the Academy for Theatre and Dance Amsterdam, the University of Music, Theatre and Media Hanover, and the Weikersheim Music Academy, and is part of the Music Swap Lab of the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen, which received the OPUS KLASSIK Award in 2021.
